If you were as intrigued by the queer overtones in the majority of Warhol's work at the Whitney's newest exhibition 'Andy Warhol - A to B and Back Again' then you'll be happy to hear about an upcoming gallery talk on that exact subject and more. Art historians **Nina Schleif** and **Trevor Fairbrother** will be discussing Warhol's representations of homoeroticism on the third floor of the Whitney in the Susan and John Hess Family Gallery and Theater. Schleif is a German art historian who wrote 'Drag and Draw Andy Warhol: The Unknown Fifties' and Fairbrother is an independent curator who's written extensively on Andy Warhol. The Whitney states that the talk will mainly cover, "Warhol's depictions of queer desire, his collaborations with the photography Otto Fenn, and the social milieu of New York's gay subculture during the McCarthy-era." The talk will also be accompanied by a screening of Jerett Robert Austin's Camille, "a drag parody of the 1936 George Cukor classic film starring Robert Taylor and Greta Garbo." ### EVENT: WORLD AIDS DAY - INTERACTIVE ART EXPERIENCE WITH JENNY HOLZER

This Saturday is World AIDS day, and as much as we all like to pretend PrEP has solved everything AIDS is still an issue, especially for those in developing countries where access to medicine is a little harder to find. On Saturday afternoon we suggest you pick up a coffee and make your way to "#LightTheFight for an interactive World AIDS Day art experience created in collaboration with world-renowned artist Jenny Holzer. The event will kick off with a ceremony and performance at the Memorial beginning at dusk (4:30 PM). The event will include a poetry reading from Jericho Brown of the Poetry Society of America, remarks from Speaker of the New York City Council Corey Johnson, a performance by the West Village Chorale and an interactive lighting ceremony. "Right after the ceremony something truly cool is going to happen." A fleet of five trucks emblazoned with LED signs will begin a journey through the city displaying a series of quotes that convey the impact, history, and ongoing battle against the AIDS epidemic worldwide. Selected and presented by Holzer, the writings by poets, activists, artists, educators, and people living with HIV and AIDS span a range of emotions from sorrow and fury to endurance and transcendence." The trucks are going to drive through the city but we'll slow down and spend some time at lingering various historically significant sites, like The LGBT Community Center, the Whitney Museum, the SVA Theater and Times Square. ## ART: ROSE TINTED - JUSTIN LIAM O'BRIEN & CELESTE RAPONE

Figurative painting has come quite far. For the sake of time, I won't dive into art history, but the times they are a changin'! Monya Rowe is the kind of gallerist who has helped usher in emerging/establishing careers for such wonderful painters like Angela Duffersen and Louis Fratino. For her latest, Rowe picked up Queens-born Justin Liam O'Brien and Chicago-based Celeste Rapone, both oil painters whose figuration uphold the conventional but carry on into the new normal. O'Brien softens figuration uphold the conventional but carry on into the new normal. O'Brien softens his nameless, unspecified males with an earthy oil palette. Pulling inspiration from Grindr, Tinder and other Apps, O'Brien "examines the psychological oversimplified social-sexual environment queer people currently inhabit." And, while yes, O'Brien's paintings explore the seriously tender side of the gay male sexuality, I also just have to say these paintings are just so sweet. Rapone is a bit more heavy handed, but I'm certainly not mad. Her languid figures cast aside O'Brien's composure for innate discord. Her canvases challenge "the boundaries between abstraction and figuration within a proposition of the properties of the properties of the properties of the properties.
